Chichester

Chichester is a Roman cathedral city and the only city in West Sussex. Evidence of Roman settlement can be found all over the city. It has a multitude of grade II listed buildings. The shopping street is pedestrianised and the Cathedral and museum are right in the heart of the city.

Arundel (Town and Castle or Wetlands Centre)

Arundel is a market town with a thousand years of history, nestling on the edge of the South Downs. Amongst its attractions are the interior and gardens of the Castle (started 1070), the Cathedral (1873) and the town. Alternatively, you could visit the Wetlands & Wildfowl Centre. *NB Castle and many shops are closed on Mondays*.

Worthing

Worthing is a lively, busy seaside town, with plenty of good restaurants and shops and a large market on a Wednesday morning. There is a lovely old pier and the beach is a mixture of sand and shingle.

Canterbury

Canterbury is an historic city with many attractions including the Cathedral, Beaney House of Art & Knowledge, the Roman Museum, Westgate Towers plus many shops and eating places.

Eltham Palace

Once a favoured medieval palace and then a Tudor royal residence, in the 1930s Eltham Palace was transformed by eccentric millionaires Stephen and Virginia Courtauld. You can visit their art deco house, the Medieval palace, the gardens and a beautiful glasshouse café.

CHICHESTER

Chichester is a Roman cathedral city and the only city in West Sussex. Evidence of Roman settlement can be found all over the city, including some Roman baths, a city wall (which was replaced by a Georgian wall), an amphitheatre which is now a park and the old Roman road Stane Street linking Chichester with London.

It has a multitude of grade II listed buildings and points of interest include the Chichester City Cross which is a type of butter market and sits in the centre of North, East, South and West streets. The City Cross was built in 1500 by Bishop Edward Storey as a shelter for people who sold their wares on market day.

Shops are mostly centered around the North, East, South and West Streets from Chichester Cross and the actual centre of Chichester has very wide pedestrianised streets so it makes it a very safe and spacious shopping experience! There are lots of spaces to enjoy lunch outside and the Cathedral and museum are right in the heart of the city.

ARUNDEL

Arundel is a market town with a thousand years of history, nestling on the edge of the South Downs.

Amongst its attractions are the following:-

Arundel Castle

The Castle is set high on a hill in Arundel and commands the landscape with magnificent views across the South Downs and the River Arun. It was founded at the end of the 11th Century, it has been the family home of the Dukes of Norfolk and their ancestors for nearly 1000 years. Between the 1870s and 1890s the house was almost completely rebuilt and the magnificent architecture in Gothic style is considered to be one of the great works of Victorian England. There is a finely preserved interior with fascinating furniture, tapestries and rare collection of paintings by renowned artists including Van Dyck, Gainsborough and Canaletto. You can also stroll through the tranquil grounds where you will discover inspiring gardens.

<u>Arundel Cathedral</u>

Arundel Cathedral is the finest example of French-Gothic revival in England The façade was modelled on 14th century French churches but was constructed in 1873. It is dedicated to Philip Howard (13th Earl of Arundel) who was imprisoned, and died in prison, for refusing to convert to Anglicanism. The cathedral is light and airy, with beautiful stained-glass windows and statues.

Arundel Wetlands Centre

The Wildfowl and Wetlands Trust was established in 1946 by Sir Peter Scott, and has been dedicated to protecting wetlands and saving Wetland Species ever since. As well as the large expanse of wetlands to explore there are boat safaris, a WWT shop and a café.

Also

There is also a state-of-the-art museum, several antiques shops and the Brewhouse Project (a tap room for Arundel Brewery).

WORTHING

Worthing is the largest town in West Sussex, and lies nestled between the English Channel and the South Downs National Park. Since the 19th century it has been nicknamed 'Sunny Worthing' thanks to its reputedly sunny and mild microclimate.

Settled since the Bronze Age, Worthing remained a small fishing hamlet until the 1750s, when various wealthy citizens visited for the hunting and fishing opportunities afforded by the area. Princess Amelia, daughter of King George III, stayed in Montague Place in 1798, which put the town firmly on the map of England's fashionable society. In the 19th century, Worthing was an elegant and fashionable resort attracting the rich and famous of the day.

It is famous for being used as the location for the movie Wish You Were Here as well as its literary connections. Oscar Wilde named the central character of The Importance of Being Earnest after the town, and wrote the play while stayed here at the height of the town's fashionability in the 1890s. Jane Austen's unfinished novel Sanditon is thought to have been significantly based on experiences from her stay in Worthing in 1805. A blue plaque marks the former home of Nobel prize-winning playwright Harold Pinter in Ambrose Place.

Today, Worthing is a lively, busy seaside town, with plenty of good restaurants and shops and a large market on a Wednesday morning. There is a lovely old pier and the beach is a mixture of sand and shingle.

CANTERBURY

Canterbury is an historic city and home to a key UNESCO World Heritage Site that incorporates three fascinating areas across the city - Canterbury Cathedral, with its stunning mixture of Romanesque and Perpendicular Gothic architecture, the modest Church of St Martin (the oldest church in the English-speaking world) and the ruins of St Augustine's Abbey, once a burial place for the Anglo-Saxon kings of Kent.

Amongst its many attractions are the following –

Canterbury Cathedral

Standing In the heart of the city it is one of the most important historic sites in the world. With sections dating back to the 11th Century, the Anglo-Gothic and Romanesque structure has been the site of numerous historical events, from planning the Magna Carta to the murder of Archbishop Thomas Becket. It remains one of the most important pilgrimage sites in Europe.

Beaney House of Art & Knowledge

This is a free Art Gallery, Library and Visitor Information Centre situated in the heart of historic Canterbury. The award wining facility provides state-of-the-art exhibition galleries, excellent educational facilities and a varied programme of events for all ages.

Canterbury Roman Museum

As you wonder through this museum you will uncover a hoard of once buried treasures including the remains of a Roman town house with preserved mosaics. The museum holds one of the UK's only remaining Roman pavement mosaics which has not been moved from its original place. This beautifully preserved Roman floor provides a fascinating insight into life in Roman Britain.

Westgate Towers

The largest and arguably the finest of the country's surviving medieval gateways, the Westgate was built during the One Hundred Years' War. The 60-foot (18m) high stronghold now stands alone, but it was the City Gaol and was eventually turned into a museum in the 20th century before being loving restored for the 21st century as a museum, bar and entertainments venue.

ELTHAM PALACE

Once a favoured medieval palace and then a Tudor royal residence, in the 1930s Eltham Palace was transformed by eccentric millionaires Stephen and Virginia Courtauld. Get a taste of the Courtaulds' extravagant lifestyle as you explore their unusual home, try on a range of period costumes, follow the family trail and admire the magnificent medieval great hall.

Items of Interest

In the art deco house - the purpose-built heated home of the Courtaulds' lemur, the panelled dining room, the luxurious golden bathroom and the underground basement (used as a games room and a bomb shelter during the Blitz).

In the Medieval Palace – the great hall, the minstrels' gallery and the glorious hammer-beam roof.

In the gardens - stunning herbaceous borders, formal rose gardens, the Rock Garden (with its pools and cascades running down to the moat) and London's oldest working bridge.

There is also a beautiful glasshouse café overlooking the playground and a multimedia tour with options for adults and families.
